Update from the Parks Department

Welcome to the first update from the Parks team at the Council and what an exciting future we can expect for the park! As most of you know, we have submitted a Heritage Lottery Bid to make improvements to the park. I know from the consultation exercise that this caused some concern, many of you fearing that we would change the character of the park. Let me put your minds at rest; it is not our intention to make major changes to the layout of the park, but to improve what we already have. I'm afraid it will be a while before we know if the bid was successful, however I'm confident we submitted a strong bid and the feedback from HLF has been very positive.

We should hear if we have succeeded in January, by which time we will have appointed a landscape architect and project manager to take us through to the second round bid and completion of the project. I'm afraid it's a lengthy process but a necessary one. During this process, there will be further opportunities for you to comment on the proposals for the park as the plans develop and I would urge you to take the time to visit the park and take a look. We and the Friends will make sure you have plenty of warning of any future consultation.

History of Grosvenor and Hilbert Park

Our park is full of history, which we will explore in more detail in future editions.



The Grosvenor Recreation Ground to the west was Tunbridge Wells' first public park. It was opened in 1889 on the site of the former Calverley Water Works, engineered by William Hilbert. In 1931 William

Hilbert's grandson, Councillor E. J. Strange, bought the "Charity Farm" lands to the north east, and presented them to the council. He requested they be named "Hilbert Recreation Grounds" after his mother, Lydia.

This land also includes the "Hilbert Recreation Ground Allotments".

The original Farmhouse, now called "Packs in the Woods" is privately owned.

The allotments share nature and wildlife with the park.

Allotment holder lan Hunter says,



"The allotments are popular with the deer who enjoy strawberry leaves and the fresh young shoots of fruit trees and raspberries. The squirrel has taken to planting acorns amongst my potatoes. The tree cover at the edge of the plots is visited by both native and migrant birds, with cross bills and redpolls noted last year."

There is one community allotment plot run by Transition Tunbridge Wells, where they spotted a Humming-bird Hawk-moth on their plot last year.

Art in the Park

TWBC have secured funding to commission 3 pieces of art on the cycle way/footpath linking the town centre to North Farm: one at Jack's Wood Spring (at the start the of cycle path), one at North Farm and one on the Grassy Knoll: the new grassed, raised area between Grosvenor Bridge and The Lake.

The Grosvenor Bridge artwork will be a permanent, significant feature, visible from both the bridge and the lake area. It will be based on two themes:

Philanthropy (since both Grosvenor and Hilbert were

donated by wealthy philanthropists to improve the health and well-being of the local people) Water (due to the proximity of the lake and Jack's Wood Spring).

£24,000 will be available for each artwork.

A shortlist of 6 artists will be made by 14 November (following submissions of interest in early November). Detailed proposals will be available for consultation with FoGH during January and February. The successful artist will be required to engage with the community in developing the artwork. Further details will be in the next newsletter.

Ever wondered about the football in the park? Read on.....



The West Kent Sunday League was formed in 1967, as a Sunday morning Association Football (Soccer) league for adults (over 16 years). In the 2011 - 2012 season there are 49 clubs fielding a total of 61 teams every Sunday, with around 2000 registered players.

Fully affiliated to the Kent County Football Association, the league is open to clubs within a 20 mile radius of Tonbridge. Most clubs are based in and around Tonbridge, Tunbridge Wells, Paddock Wood and Crowborough, with several clubs from each town, as well as in the surrounding villages. The more distant clubs include Biggin Hill, Cranbrook Town

(based in Benenden), Dormansland Rockets, Green Street Blues (based in Orpington) and Her Majesty's Prison at Blantyre House near Goudhurst.

There are 6 divisions, with between 6 and 12 teams in the divisions.

The following teams use the Hilbert playing fields as their home ground:;

The Palace FC (in Division Four), Black Horse (TW) (in Division Five) and King William IV FC (in Division Six).

Hilbert Woods Local Nature Reserve A haven for wildlife in the heart of town

One of the lesser known charms of the Grosvenor and Hilbert Park is the Hilbert Woods Local Nature Reserve. Officially designated as an LNR in 2000, the reserve forms the northern most point of the park, and includes over 5 hectares of ancient woodland, wildflower grassland, and iron-rich streams. The Kent High Weald Partnership manages the conservation interest of Hilbert Woods LNR on behalf of TWBC. Every year, KHWP



organises and leads over 100 days of volunteer work on the reserve, helping to take care of its special habitats and important wildlife.



A key management activity that volunteers have helped to realise over the past decade is the re-introduction of coppicing to Roundabout Woods (with the boardwalk). Hazel trees are cut down to their base on a 6-year cycle. Poles (the larger, straighter growth) are then used as stakes for hedgelaying projects, whilst the brash (thin and leafy branches) are stacked and staked to make habitat piles. These piles create a useful new home for small mammals and invertebrates, and help to protect the growing coppice stools from browsing by the local urban deer population!

Hilbert Woods LNR is well worth a visit throughout the year. Surfaced paths lead into the woodland, with wooden boardwalks and steps helping to keep the wetter areas accessible to all. Veteran oak trees, tall alders and shimmering silver birch feature throughout the woods, and create a colourful backdrop to any nature

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
