I studied Countryside Management at Plumpton College and have had varying countryside roles with conservation charities (such as Kent Wildlife Trust) and local government bodies. Previously, I was Assistant Partnership Officer for Kent High Weald Partnership – so you may have already met me in Hilbert Woods, at National Play Day or at bat walks last year! My role is mainly to deliver the Activity Plan for the Park's Heritage Lottery Fund Project. This means working closely with the Friends group and Kent High Weald Partnership, as well as the local community, groups, schools and organisations to conserve and improve the Park's landscape and heritage. There will be events, activities and education, as well as opportunities for learning, volunteering and participating.

Chairman's Letter

Firstly, all of us in the Friends group would like to give a very warm welcome to Cally Fiddimore, our newly recruited Community Engagement Officer, who will be helping to involve the wider community with all aspects of Park activities. She has already been busy arranging activities for teenage Park users and has helped with and augmented our summer calendar of events.



Back in February, when we were all recovering from the incessant rain and storms of last winter, Kent High Weald Partnership took on the challenge of repairing the submerged 'pallet bridge' in Folly Shaw. This had degenerated into a chalybeate quagmire during the worst of the weather. In a few hours, they had cleared the water course and transformed an obstacle course into a fully functional link for the walking route through the Park, which has been greeted with great appreciation by many Park users.

The winter weather played a problematic hand in our arrangements for the Family Fun Day this year. The lower football pitch had been waterlogged for so long that large areas were too boggy to use for stalls or entertainment stands. We decided to spread the layout from the upper football pitch right through the Park to the hard court area by the lake. With the weather kindly gracing us with a glorious sunny day, there seemed to be plenty of room for the 8000 or so people who came to enjoy the day.

As before, the Parks Department of Tunbridge Wells Borough Council helped with many important preparations and I would especially like to thank Peter Every for this continued valuable support. Additionally, many kind people from the neighbourhood volunteered to help with stewarding and to get stalls and gazebos up and working, as well as helping with packing away and tidying up at the end of the day. A truly community inspired effort, making it all the more enjoyable and worthwhile.



In this, our 125th year since the Park's inauguration, it's relevant to reflect upon the spirit that motivated Councillor John Stone Wigg to donate the land for the Grosvenor Recreation Ground for the use of the local population for their recreation and pleasure. With our activities in the Friends Group, we feel that we have put Grosvenor and Hilbert Park firmly back into the main stream of attention as a highly valued community space, proved by so many people coming along to join in the variety of events that we have organised.

Update from the Parks Department

Since the last newsletter, we have moved on from the initial excitement of the HLF award, with a lot of work carried out in the background. We now have a number of jobs that need starting ahead of the main works later this year and very shortly you will see things start to happen. The following works have been commissioned:



- · Moving the telegraph pole in Rochdale Road.
- Moving the sub station from its old location.
- Removing silt from the pond and installing aeration pads to clear the water.

In order for the sub station to be moved, we need to move the Sodexo container out of the compound and the plan is to move it over to the Oast House while the work is being carried out. The Park keeper will remain in the Pavilion for the time being. We will need to open the historic entrance to facilitate the work, however, we will ensure the entrance is secured once UK Power Network have finished.

We now have a new team member in Cally Fiddimore, our HLF Community Engagement Officer who you will see around the Park. Cally's main job is to deliver the activity plan for the next five years and will be looking for volunteers, so if you're interested, contact Cally (<u>cally.fiddimore@tunbridgewells.gov.uk</u>).

Over the winter I have been made aware of a number of maintenance issues in the Park and, in particular, the lack of staff on site. This has been discussed with Sodexo's senior managers and I have been assured this will be addressed for the future. Sodexo have agreed to bring in Staff from another contract to catch up on some of the work they failed to complete over winter. In addition, they have appointed a new contract manager to review how the contract is delivered and make any changes necessary: please be assured they are contractually obliged to provide a Park keeper in the Park.

Climb and Punishment

Laura Ansell gave us a talk at The Allotment pub on February 19th about her charity climb of Mount Kilimanjaro. This fund-raising climb was for Village Education Project Kilimanjaro (VEPK), a charity providing educational resources to the Kilimanjaro region in Tanzania. Laura funded the trip by doing 'good deeds' in return for a donation, included ironing, cooking, gardening, decorating and a host of other things! Along the way, she got involved in befriending the elderly, helping disabled children to access activities and mentoring homeless people. One of her good deeds was helping at the



2013 Family Fun Day, so we were keen to hear how she got on with her climb in September 2013.

Laura gave an excellent description of the climb, and the workings behind Kilimanjaro, a source of employment for many locals. I had never considered the incredible range of climates from rainforest mountain base to snowy peak, the regimented daily climb timetable and permanent camp-sites on the mountain and all the waste created by the many charity climbers. It was a fascinating insight, warts and all, sharing the struggles, personal conflicts and amazing triumph.

She painted a vivid picture of Tanzania and the work done by VEPK and happily answered all our questions afterwards. While the sun was shining on the day, a very wet winter meant we had to plan for minimal use of the lower playing

field. The main focus moved to the older Grosvenor half of the Park, fitting as 125 years ago the Park was officially opened. This year, the stage was on the hard standing court and here the Town Crier introduced The Mayor, Councillor Dr Ronen Basu, who opened the event. He was joined by St James' Councillors David Neve and Ben Chapelard, and the FoGH patron, Greg Clark MP. An afternoon of music and dance followed.









Scuffed Soul started the show, followed by performances from, Issy Cee, Milly McCarron, James Wood, Second Helpin, Sean de Burca, The Rich List, David Warren and Rocinia.

Flamenco Mosaico entertained in between performances. Recall Theatre brought the cast of Les Miserables who filled the stage! Hedgehogs in the Park revisited

Hedgehog Awareness Week 2014 was 4th – 10th May, so now is an ideal time to revisit last year's hedgehog survey. I was told of a number of hedgehog sightings, but sadly only a few people completed the survey. However, there were sightings in Ravenswood and Auckland Road and one was seen in the Park between the Bowling Green and the wetland area. Recently, a hedgehog was found in lower Auckland Road and droppings



were seen in Dorking Road. There is a population in the area, so the survey will carry on. If you see a hedgehog or their droppings (and don't forget to listen for snorts and snuffles when it starts to get dark: they are noisy creatures), please download our survey form at www.FoGH.org.uk/hedgehogs

Hedgehog numbers have collapsed by 37% in the last 10 years, with the alarm first raised by members of the public and amateur observations are important in estimating hedgehog numbers. In good habitats, they can be found at about one per hectare (about 25 typical back gardens). They like leafy suburbs with green spaces like parks, playing fields and allotments, but need at least a square kilometre of well-connected habitat to sustain a population. The Park and surrounding area should be ideal, but they need our help.

One garden is not enough: they need a patchwork of gardens with a variety of micro-habitats and food sources. Gardens are often fragmented by fences and walls, which is where 'Hedgehog Street' comes in!



Become a 'Hedgehog Champion' and make your garden hedgehog-friendly:

- Eliminate hazards
- Strim carefully, give ponds gently sloping edges & check bonfires before lighting.
- Be careful with garden or sports netting: hedgehogs (and birds) get entangled.
- Never give hedgehogs bread & milk: it upsets their stomachs. Use meat cat food.
- ❖Give hedgehogs what they need (food, water and shelter).
- Let a corner of your garden get wild & avoid chemicals to encourage invertebrates.
- · Give them a dish of water in hot dry weather.
- Don't be too tidy: hedgehogs need leaves to make nests with & shrubs to build them under.

❖Talk to your neighbours: make hedgehog-sized holes (13 cm/5 inches square) between your gardens Hedgehog Street is community conservation in action and lets you enjoy a connection with a genuinely wild animal in your back garden! (See www.hedgehogstreet.org/ for more information.)




Bridging The Gap

Volunteers from the Kent High Weald Partnership were out in force on Wednesday 26th February 2014, working in Hilbert Woods Local Nature Reserve within the Park. One team worked on clearing brambles in the wood, while a second team constructed a temporary bridge over the Chalybeate stream close to Folly Shaw.



Although the Heritage Lottery funding has been agreed for improvements to the Park, the pallet bridge was in urgent



Hopefully this temporary bridge will last until the permanent, Heritage Lottery funded one is built. This will be a new timber bridge and viewing platform over the stream and its associated wetland area. The banks will be re-graded and re-seeded. Slightly further downstream, an area subject to water-logging will be managed as a wetland area, with marginal planting and specimen trees. This work is currently scheduled to start from spring 2015, subject to confirmation. **Chris Hughes**

You will need:


- Thin cardboard
