We discuss feedback from members and park users, as well as maintenance and improvement work, so this input is always relevant and helpful.



I am hopeful that the repairs to the damaged pumps to the Dripping Wells will be made very soon. Protracted delays have been caused between Southern Water, who are responsible for the drainage, and TWBC, who maintain the pumps, by negotiations over who should pay. I gather that this has now reached a conclusion and the work is scheduled to commence shortly.

Following such mercurial weather earlier this year, we were very lucky that our Family Fete on Bank Holiday Monday 7th May coincided with the first really warm spell. The slightly smaller array of activities and stalls seemed to work well, with plenty of people turning out to enjoy an afternoon's sunshine. This made it a much more manageable event for our committee and additional volunteers, to whom I would like to offer a huge thank you. Especially to those who saved the day at the last minute, when we were unexpectedly surprised by a breakdown and lack of transport - we couldn't do it without you all!!

Steff has arranged a brilliant array of events, ecological, crafty and always informative, for the next few months. FoGH have our Picnic in the Park on Sunday 15th July to celebrate 'Love Parks Week'. There was considerable damage to the pumps and the electric circuits, some of which may need replacing. To carry out the work, we need to drop the level of the lake slightly, but it won't be completely emptied. The Dripping Wells should be up and running by the time you read this newsletter.



May saw the visit of the Green Flag judges, who spent a couple of hours in the Park, and made some very positive comments. They were impressed with the community orchard and the wetland area. Of course, they gave nothing away, but I'm sure we will retain the Green Flag for another year. Later in July the Park will be visited by the South and South East in Bloom judge, and this year we are lucky to have Jim Buttress visiting the Park. Jim has many years experience judging at high levels and is a Chelsea Flower show judge. Let's hope we can move up from last year's Silver Guilt to Gold.

The FoGH Family Fete was blessed with fabulous weather and the Tunbridge Wells Bloom team had a stand at the Auckland Road entrance with the big plant giveaway. We had a very busy day and met a lot of enthusiastic gardeners. Many people donated towards the campaign and we raised £333 towards Bloom projects around the town. I would like to thank everyone who donated and for your support.





Steff's Sum Up

These last couple of months have been incredibly busy in the Park, getting ready for the arrival of summer and making the most of any lovely spells of weather. The pollinator surveys have started up again with the volunteers and the Wildlife Gardening Project is back, thanks to popular demand and our Tesco Bags of Help funding.

The conservation volunteers have finished sweeping the gravel from the pathways around the Park, removing over 35 tonne bags of gravel in total. Thank you so much to those who have helped! The volunteers, with help from a fantastic group of corporate volunteers, planted over 450 plants. This filled in gaps that have formed around the pathways through the Park and by Marnock Lake since the landscape works were completed.



Nikki Gammans from The Bumblebee Conservation Trust ran a fantastic training day on bumblebee identification. During the outdoor afternoon session, we managed to spot 5 of the Big 8 species as well as many other interesting types of mining bee.

The National Fruit Show popped along to the Park to run an apple tasting event for us. This introduced the different varieties of apples found locally, as well as giving a taste of the many different forms this fruit can come in, from crisp to juice!



Our stream dipping event also went well, with only one or two wet welly boots by the end of the sessions! We managed to catch a handful of different creatures in the stream including freshwater shrimp, cased and caseless



caddisfly larvae and a leech or two. The wildlife gardening

groups have been busy in the allotment learning about, and planting, beans, potatoes, radishes and much more, as well as making scarecrows to keep the pigeons at bay.

I have been busy getting the events programme ready for the summer. We have everything from moth identification mornings to treasure hunts coming up over the next couple of months. 
blackcurrants and gooseberry bushes are all looking healthier after a good weed and prune. They too are flowering, so we hope for a good crop this year.
