The FoGH Dog Show 2019

A small team of volunteers turned up from 8.30 on the morning to set up the event/arena. A basic agility course was part of the show, enabling dogs and owners to test their skills before, in between and after the main events of

There were cakes, cookies, hot/cold drinks, and free portable dog bowls (courtesy of Pets Pyjamas who help holiday makers find dog friendly hotels). These were available to all attendees.

Approximately 30 dogs attended with their families, to enter the variety of doggy competitions. We had the more proper (Most Obedient/Best Child Handler) tests, through endearing (Cutest Puppy/Scruffiest Dog) to the entertaining (Best Trick/Best Fancy Dress). All classes had a variety of entrants of all shapes and sizes for the judges to carefully evaluate.



Judging was by the experienced eyes and unquestionable integrity of Father John from St Barnabus Church and by local artist Chris Burke. The top three dogs in each category won a rosette.

There were also treats for the First and Second prize winners from Pets Pyjamas. Father John had to keep the bag of treats well away from all the interested dogs!

Prizes for the overall Best in Show were donated by Helios, a Camden Road based homeopathy business and Battersea dogs (and cats) home.

This does mean we will see changes in the number of activities staged in the Park, although our colleagues from Kent High Weald Partnership will be working with us to programme activities over the summer. We will also be saying goodbye to our wonderful Community Engagement Officer Emma Peters, who will be leaving us in the middle of June. Emma is moving on to Essex Wildlife trust to carry out a similar role. Of course I'm sure you will all join me in wishing her luck in her new role.

Emma's Update

Summer is nearly upon us, and the Park is buzzing with activity - from our wildflowers regrowing, to birds, bees, and butterflies in the skies once more. Our resident mallards have their first brood of ducklings, and there was a promising amount of frogspawn in the Wetlands too, so be prepared for a wild season to come at Grosvenor & Hilbert Park!



It's been a busy period for our conservation volunteers, who have been hard at work planting in the gaps and weeding around Marnock Lake. We've sown wildflower seeds in a new cleared area at the border of Appledore Wood, done wildlife surveys, and

created a living willow dome.

The dome is already producing many green shoots and leaves, and should look fantastic come summer - verv inviting for anybody wishing to have a

wander through its tunnels. You can find the dome at the edge of Appledore Wood, near the entrance to the boardwalk.

If you would like to volunteer in the Park, please take a look at the FoGH website or Kent High Weald Partnership's website for opportunities. Volunteering covers many areas and interests such as nature surveys,

one-off event assistance, and conservation work to keep the Park looking at its best.





We have had a wide variety of events run over the past few months, from an Astronomy evening with the Mid Kent Astronomical Society. skateboarding sessions with Team Rubicon, World Water Day, a screen printing taster workshop and many other activities.

On the first bat walk of the year we only spotted Common Pipistrelle bats. We hoped to see Noctules and Soprano Pippistrelles. There are more

exciting upcoming events in the Park to get involved in if you missed any of the above. Try pond dipping, moth trapping with lan Beavis, or other arts and crafts events.

March saw the end of the HLF funding in Grosvenor and Hilbert Park, which was celebrated with a key stakeholders event, and a new photo display showcasing the progress over the past five years. As I only came into the Community Engagement Officer role in the past year, it was truly incredible to look back through the photos. The improvements made over the course of the project will hopefully be enjoyed for many years to come. We also launched the Grosvenor and Hilbert Park video, which can be found on the Facebook and Twitter pages.





Now that the project has ended in the Park,

the HLF funded Community Engagement Officer role is ending too. It has come around quicker than expected - this will be my last newsletter update as Community Engagement Officer for the Park! I have secured a new role with Essex Wildlife Trust in their outdoor education team. I have a few smaller events planned before I leave in June, so keep an eye on our Facebook page, Twitter feed, and in-park posters to get more information.

I will be sad to leave the Park, but I am very grateful for all the experiences and opportunities it has provided,



as well as all the lovely people I have had the chance to work with and meet in this role.

Future Events & Volunteer Activities in the Park
