#### News from the FoGH Committee

Hello everyone. This year has flown by, it seems the long nights have come around far too quickly. We had incredibly warm days in October, followed by three storms (Babet, Ciarán, Debi) and what feels like endless rain. While the Park is full of autumn colour, underfoot is very wet, and many leaves have already fallen. And it's not just leaves – recently a very large oak tree in Roundabout Wood suddenly fell onto the skateboard area, damaging some of the railings. The skate park remains closed until further notice, and Treeworks are tidying the woodland area.

It's hard to think back to the sunny days of September and early October, when we were celebrating the successes of both the Green Flag Award and In Bloom. In early September, we celebrated raising the new Green Flag with a tea-party. This was just before the birthday of park-keeper Tony Cheeseman, so we ensured he had some cake before he helped us raise the new Green Flag. Once again we would like to thank Tony for all he does for the Park, and also the help he gave to FoGH with Apple Day.

There are several levels of 'Britain In Bloom' judging. In South and South East In Bloom, there were two awards for Tunbridge Wells: Gold and



Winner in the Small City category, also Gold and Winner in the Best Community Engagement section. Grosvenor and Hilbert Park won Gold in the Large Park category. FoGH achieved level 5 Outstanding in the S & SEIB It's Your Neighbourhood section. A new Community Participation award has been introduced for It's Your Neighbourhood – we were awarded Gold and judged Winners! Well done everyone!

Chris Hughes and I went to the RTW In Bloom Awards ceremony at The Assembly Hall to pick up our community awards, and to cheer on all the local residents, schools and businesses collecting their awards. On October 23rd the National Britain In Bloom Awards were held in London, and featured on BBC One Show. The Small City national category winner was Newcastle-under-Lyme, who were also Overall Britain in Bloom winner.

It is the spirit of these 'green' groups that we would like to bring to the Park, with the support of



Tunbridge Wells Borough Council/ RTW In Bloom. This project is in the planning stages, and we'll be

announcing more about this in the new year. Working alongside TWBC is something we continue to do. In September, a few of the committee met with members of TWBC Parks Dept, KHWP, and U3A Gardening Group, to discuss working work better together in 2024 and beyond.

I also attended the TWBC 'Better Streets Workshop' in The Hub. Ideas were being collected across the St Johns and St James Wards, and the morning highlighted issues on many local roads with parking and crossing problems. I suggested (again) lighting along the cycle path in the park and double yellow lines in front of the Auckland Rd gates.







In late August KHWP ran a Bat Walk in the Park. It started at the Hub, with a talk on bats, then craft activities and a fun game of bats versus moths. Then it was off into the Park with the bat detectors!

As it had rained, the only bats seen were Common Pipistrelles, but they put on a great show over the beaver dam. Many thanks to Steph and Tirzah for a fun evening.

#### Hard at Work in the Park

Volunteers have again been busy in the Park with a number of tasks. Early September saw work start on extending the Wildflower Meadow in the Orchard. This is a joint initiative with Kent High Weald Partnership (KHWP), who have secured a grant from the Sussex Lund Trust to buy a heavy duty scarifier for the project. To encourage wildflowers to grow, the grass and thatch needs to be removed.



So the grass was cut as short as possible (strimmed and mowed repeatedly), then the area was scarified. This was time consuming, as after each cut or scarify the grass needed raking off and removing. Over two days three long strips were completed, leaving bare soil ready for seed to be sown. We sowed yellow rattle, which will

spring. Yellow rattle is a semi-parasitic annual that feeds off the nutrients in the roots of grass. By weakening vigorous grasses, it helps more delicate, traditional species thrive.

At the end of September, KHWP volunteers were working in the wetland area. Using a power scythe, the grass and sedges in one area were cut and removed for composting. Some willow was cut down (it will grow again), as it can become guite invasive and encroach into the ponds. The area is being managed to provide greater biodiversity through a number of different habitats.

after the work before scything Community Planting days took place in early October. The deal is they provide the plants and we provide volunteers to put them in. Over the years some plants have failed, so this allowed us to fill some gaps. The first day we planted the borders by the bowls green and Hub area, then around Marnock Lake on the second day. The plants went in well and look as though they have been there for some time -

Finally, we planted another 500 purple crocus bulbs at the Upper Grosvenor Road entrance, to enhance the spring display. The bulbs were provided by RTW Rotary Club to raise awareness of their 'Purple for Polio' fight for a polio free world.
